#### 4. President's Report

**Kevin Whitcraft, President** presented his report on the past year.

The past year was a year in transition from a 2020 where the world came to a standstill due to the COVID Pandemic. IODA was fortunate to host one championship that year. We are grateful to Portoroz in Slovenia for making that happen.

For 2021, it was a recovery year for IODA on two fronts. First, we were able to host almost all our Championships albeit late in the year except for the Africans. A few were rescheduled as late as possible as the pandemic peaked and valleyed throughout the year and travel restrictions were

gradually being lifted. We are so very grateful for all our Event Organizers who had to increase their planning to accommodate the Covid health restrictions that were put in place by governments. Special mention goes to my home club who in Thailand created a complete health security bubble on the venue and the hotel. Staff all stayed on site. Only the Teams and limited officials could go the hotel in a bus. There was no access to the public.

Second, due to some of the decisions we made a year ago by increasing our Plaque Fees, that we had a good recovery financially, particularly from the year before when revenues were down over 50%. We managed our budgets and cash flow over the year and kept a close eye on spending. The only difficult expense item to control was travel to events. Limited flights to various parts of the world were expensive and getting officials to our events was very difficult.

Activity in Optimist activity started to blossom in 2021 due to the lifting of travel restrictions, more events taking place and pent-up demand. Optimist sailing became very popular as an individual sport taking place in the open air and Optimist sailing schools began to start filling up. The industry was also in recovery with increased sales in both boats and sails particularly in the last quarter of 2021. We ended up on a positive note with a positive bottom line.

Last year we introduced a new pilot program called ROPE (Recycled Optimist Parts and Equipment), which is part of our sustainability strategy. It turned out to be a huge success with recognition as a finalist in the World Sailing 11th Hour Sustainability Awards. We were thrilled with the recognition, and we will be increasing our energy and focus in this area. Many members have been asking about the program which is very encouraging. Ultimately, we want to scale up the program and bring on a sponsor.

The Regatta and Technical Committees continue to pull out all the stops in their delivery of our IODA Championships as well as monitor the one design integrity of our class. All the members of our two technical committees are very dedicated to their roles within the Optimist Class. We are very fortunate to have such qualified volunteers working on your behalf.

We brought on two new builders last year and there are additional builders coming online in 2022. Builder activity is brisk with new builders coming online each year. Operational efficiencies continue to be a focus in both the events and measurement with the move to online and digital forms and data collection.

Our Vice Presidents continue to work hard in their regions to find ways to promote the Optimist for their Members and communicate regularly on many issues. They too are extremely dedicated to the Optimist Class to see that it remains the top Youth sailing class in the world.

Building and growing Optimist Sailing is a major goal for IODA. Developing new sailors and coaches will be a focus later this year. We are completely overhauling our development curriculum and delivery for a launch in 2023. We are working with top level coaches to help advise us in this area. The coaches are significant stakeholders in the Optimist Class, and we look forward to working with them in the future.

Last year we started a partnership with Harken Derm to introduce the importance of skin care for sailors who spend many hours in the sun. We feel that education is the key to learning about how to keep safe from sun damage. We are partnering with Harken Dern again this year and together hosted a Webinar with Dr. Edit Olasz Harken in May as part of our new partnership this year.

Next year is a very important year for IODA with 3 milestones to celebrate. It is 75 years since the birth of the Optimist by Clarke Mills who built the first Optimist pram in Florida that later morphed

into the Optimist Dinghy. It is 50 years since the modern Optimist became an International Class with the IRYU, now World Sailing, and it is the 60th year of the World Championship.

We want to celebrate this year with several exciting programs for all our sailors, families, and members. This is a year to bring past and present Optimist sailors together and share the Opti aunique Opti experience. We look forward to engaging with all of you on the many programs and initiatives that we are planning.

I want to thank the members of the Executive Committee, Technical & Regatta Committee members and the Secretariat for their continued work and support. They all work tirelessly in their individual roles and collectively together on behalf of Optimist sailors around the world.

# 5. Vice President's Reports - VP (Africa, Asia & Oceania), VP (Americas), VP (Europe)

## a) Ajay Narang, VP Africa Asia & Oceania presented his report.

Throughout the Optimist community, sailing programmes, events and initiatives are starting to take place more and more frequently now, as parents and young sailors around the world begin to overcome the challenges surrounding the COVID-19 pandemic. It is clear to see, however, that many of our members and sailors still face issues and challenges to get back on the water.

I am certain that going forward, the international sailing events which feature the Optimist Class hosted at Bahrain, Oman, Abu Dhabi, India, Pakistan, Singapore, Hong Kong, Thailand, S Korea, Japan, China, Seychelles, S Africa, Australia and New Zealand will once again be back on the radar and at IODA, we will continue with our focus on supporting the community.

The 2021 Optimist Asian & Oceanian Championship was a week-long regatta hosted by the RVYC, Thailand's premier sailing boat club with classes and events for all ages. The event was organized by International Optimist Dinghy Association (IODA) and hosted by the RVYC in conjunction with Thailand Optimist Dinghy Academy and Yacht Racing Association of Thailand, and primary sponsor Idemitsu. After two years of preparation including onerous tasks to comply with strict pandemic control measures, the event ended in spectacular success.

The 2022 Optimist Asian & Oceanian Championship scheduled at S Korea has had to be cancelled due Covid19 related restrictions and we are actively pursuing with alternate venues to host the event in the latter half of the year in a safe and fair environment.

I would also like to thank all nations that are registered to participate at the 2022 IODA African Championship being hosted by South Africa. Whilst, currently very few African MNAs have registered for the event, I hope that in the next few days many more nations will register for the event and I that we have an extremely successful IODA African Championship at South Africa this year.

Last year we introduced a series of webinars focussed on promoting greater accessibility to the sport for female participants and introduced many first-time sailors to the sport. The legacy of these webinars is already evident, with an encouraging sign of increased female membership within some clubs in Asia and Africa. We intend to continue such webinars going forward.

## b) **Sigrid Beckmann, VP Americas** presented her report.

It has been quite a busy and successful year for the Americas Region after the slow restart post Covid Pandemic. More than two years after its start, I can say that most of the region has been able to recover and restart with a lot of energy and upbeat outlook. While some countries struggled more than others and some are taking longer to do so, the Region is back, holding all kinds of sailing events, clinics, regattas and lots of travel.

After 2 years of this life changing event, it is important to mention that everyone at IODA worked very hard to provide safe environments in our events. Very hard decisions had to be made, sometimes last minute, to make sure we were not only compliant, but also sensitive to the worldwide struggle to overcome this unique event. Lots of details had to be secured as we faced a lot of responsibility to provide our sailors, parents, coaches, providers, organizers and IODA officials with a safe yet happy environment. All our events were Covid free. I want to thank everyone that made this huge feat possible.

### **Events**

2021 North American Championship in Nuevo Vallarta, Mexico (May 29- June 8, 2021) Extraordinary organization in the first big event in the region after the Covid breakout began. The Vallarta Yacht Club, led by Linda Green and a tremendously hard-working team of volunteers, once again delivered an amazing event with a fleet of 110 sailors (71 boys and 39 girls), from 11 countries (ARG, BAH, BER, BRA, CAY, GUA, ISV, MEX, PUR, and USA).

2021 South American Championship in Mar de Plata, Argentina (December 11-18, 2021) After an almost 2-year delay, we finally celebrated the most anticipated Continental Championship ever. The Club Naútico Mar de Plata, did an outstanding job, led by our favorite Optimist friend, Matias Capizzano and the most dedicated team of organizers, who along amazing volunteers gifted us a very emotional Championship. The difficulties encountered in years of preparation, postponements, delays and unknowns have been unique.

A total of 155 sailors (104 boys and 51 girls), from 11 countries (ARG, BER, BRA, CAN, CHI, ECU, MEX, PER, PUR, URU and USA) sailed together and shared being together once more.

### **New Members**

Last year we were incredibly happy to welcome Panama to the Optimist family. With this highly energized and very organized member, we are sure that Panama will start making waves in the Optimist circuit. Welcome! Venezuela has rejoined IODA after some years when we really missed them. We are very happy to see them back in the circuit. Welcome back!

# **ROPE Program**

The vision of ROPE is to introduce children to social responsibility, sustainability, and the circular economy. It started as a peer-to-peer program whereby children donate gently used equipment at IODA Championships so that there is a legacy to the local community for programs that need equipment.

With over 175,000 Optimists built over the past 40 years, many which are still being used today there is an abundance of hulls and gently used equipment that can be re-used for learn to sail-programs a number of regions, and emerging nations around the world.

Sailors bring extra equipment to IODA Championships so it can be collected, catalogued and distributed to local sailing schools in need as well as to specific schools, clubs, and countries that are in dire need of equipment, giving it a second life and good use.

ROPE was launched during the 2021 North American Championship in Nuevo Vallarta, Mexico and it became an instant success. The sailors were very interested in participating and this new idea and it paved the way for the following editions in Worlds at Lake Garda and South Americans in Mar de Plata.

Equipment donated and collected at the 2021 Optimist North American Championships in Mexico was donated to local sailing schools, Escuela de Vela La Cruz, the Vallarta Yacht Club Sailing

Program and also to Make Them Sailors in Bahamas. The equipment collected at the World Championships in Italy, was redistributed to the Hyderabad Foundation Program in India, an organization that introduces young kids from under privileged families to sailing.

Equipment collected at the South American Championships in Argentina has been donated to Capitanes de Barrio in Barrancas, Argentina and Escuela Itinerante NEA Posadas in Posadas, Argentina. Both strive to make sailing inclusive and within easier reach for children.

Equipment collected at the Asian & Oceanians Championship in Thailand was donated to the Optimist Sailing School in Phuket, a small school with an inclusive sailing program.

The ROPE program was one of four finalists in the prestigious 'World Sailing - 11th Hour Sustainability Award' in 2021. This is an amazing recognition to our sailors' generosity and commitment to have both, a sustainable Class and to make sailing an inclusive and socially responsible way of life.

We hope to make this program bigger and be able to reach out to more communities around the World. Thank you for your donations and continued support!

### **Harken Derm Partnership**

I have been extremely lucky to be involved directly with the launch of our partnership with Harken Derm and to work directly with Dr. Edit Olasz, Aliz Savay and Alex Kellerman. # c) Carmen Casco, VP Europe presented her report.

The 2021 Optimist European Championship took place June 20th-27th in El Puerto de Santa Maria, Cadiz, ESP. 271 sailors, 155 boys and 116 girls, participated from 38 countries from which 6 countries were outside Europe. Xavier García Olle, ESP and Kleopatra Anastassiou, GRE were the winners of the EC. (ARG, AUT, BEL, BER, BRA, BUL, CRO, CYP, CZE, DEN, EST, FIN, FRA, GER, GBR, GRE, HUN, IRL, ISR, ITA, JPN, LTU, MLT, NED, NOR, POL, POR, ROU, RUS, SVK, SLO, ESP, SWE, SUI, THA, TUR, UKR, USA). It was an excellent event. Good wind conditions and well organized. A lot of positive feedback was received from our members.

The 2021 European Team Racing Championship took place end of August and was held in Lago di Ledro, ITA. The championship was represented by the following 15 teams: BEL, CRO, DEN, FIN, FRA, GBR, ISR, ITA, LAT, POL, RUS, SLO, ESP, SWE, UKR. Lots of wind changes and difficult conditions made it a challenging championship. Winners: 1. Spain, 2. Italy, 3. Russia

# 6. Technical Committee Report

Olive Parker, the Technical Committee (TC) Chair presented her report.

The IODA Technical Committee comprises of Jean Luc from France, Bala from India, Conxa our Prototype Measurer from Spain with Curly Morris as advisor, and myself Olive Parker, Chair of TC, from Ireland. With the support of Fiona Kidd, IODA Secretary General and Susan Elliott Beatty, Regatta Secretary, we have been able to promote the Optimist as the largest one design class in the world.

The IODA TC is responsible for ensuring the class is a One Design Class and responsible to carry out measurement for World Championships and 5 Continental Championships, allowing us to carry out equipment inspections on close to 1000 boats each year, without taking into consideration any factory inspections.

The TC has been working alongside the Regatta Committee in implementing a paperless measurement system and together with the Secretary General we are proceeding to eliminate all paper in relation to all measurement books and certificates going into 2023 and beyond. We are now starting a process to digitize Registration and Measurement Books and Sail Measurement certs. We are also working with manufacturers of our equipment to streamline pars and foils and have more control in the manufacturing and the building processes of these components to ensure when a sailor buys a piece of equipment, they will know they are class legal.

Training measurers around the world for our class is an important project the TC is constantly trying to improve. Unfortunately, due to COVID this has proven slightly more difficult than we would have liked, however, we have a with the help of Sigrid, VP of America, a Measurement Seminar planned for NAMS in Bahamas, and we are planning with the help of Carmen, European VP, for a measurement seminar to take place in Europe and we will post more details on this social media in the coming weeks.

We cannot do our job without our class measurers and without these volunteers, for example as Ms. Jang (Korea) Ale Williman (URU) and John Gillard (ANT) who are all here at this event we could not possibly carry out measurement at events. Since the AGM last year, we have carried out equipment inspections on over 600 boats and equipment. By the end of the year, we will have inspected over 1000 boats and equipment.

Our Objectives this year due to COVID19 were restricted unfortunately. But, following fundamental measurement at events, we have carried out inspections at factories, but now, together with the Regatta Committee, we have developed the technology to move our paperless systems that we introduced last year to run the totally paperless measurement part at our events. Our system now accepts PDF of sail certs and measurement books linked to sailors which has greatly helped with contact for COVID, is more environment friendly, certainly more efficient for measurers and sailors alike. We are continuing to develop this process and we need to engage with the sailors, team leaders and associations to ensure we can eliminate unnecessary paper at our events as part of our "green" agenda.

With travelling opening we have been able to attend at some builders' factories, meet new builders and help with the development of our class.

We have also reviewed our templates and are reducing the cost of these and modernizing these to make them lighter for travel, which cuts down costs. We are constantly reviewing the class rules and are currently upgrading the sail plans.

We carried out fundamental measurement at events last year and we will do so again this year at the Europeans in Denmark. This is extremely important for the class to enable us to check builders and ensuring they are complying with our class rules. We thank the sailors and teams for cooperating with us to do this job.

Our Prototype Measurer has been busy this year with visits to 6 factories helping them to improve their moulds and approving 2 new builders to the class. We are currently working with two new builders in the hope that they will start production over the next few months.

We are working with some builders reviewing different materials for boat building with the hope we

can build boats both cheaper, sustainably, keep costs down and make it easier for builders worldwide.

Thanks to Fiona Kidd our Secretary General for constant support and regular contact with our builders and equipment suppliers and Susan Elliot Beatty for her continuous support to the TC throughout the year.

# 7. Regatta Committee Report

Ricardo Navarro, the Regatta Committee Chair presented his report.

The IODA Regatta Committee (RC) is responsible each year for 1 World Championship, 5 Continental Championships, 5 Team Racing Championships, and 2 Nations Cup Championships with the participation of over 1,000 sailors worldwide. The IODA RC is fortunate to have an excellent and professional working atmosphere amongst its members - Chair Ricardo Navarro (IRO, ITD/BRA), Andres Perez (IJ/ESP), Ilker Bayindir (IRO, IJ/TUR) and Elena Papazoglou (IRO/CYP) - with the full support of Susan Elliot Beatty, the IODA Regatta Secretary.

The technical achievements for the successful delivery of the IODA events, developed by the IODA Regatta Committee over recent years, are now well known, and have enriched the experience of the Optimist sailor at the IODA championships. These include the Official Event Microsites, the Scoring Package, the Accreditation, and the unique Measurement system in conjunction with the IODA TC. The Event APP has optimized the event delivery for the smart phone, enabling team delegations and their supporters to experience all aspects including tracking, with ease. The introduction of the 'Sailor Account' last year, eliminated paper and provided a digital portable Race Office that quickly gained favour among coaches and sailors. This year the final race office forms unique to Optimist Class are now digital. All of this technology for event management, including registration, is provided to the Event Organisers of IODA Championships, eliminating any concern of IODA Members regarding these key areas. Most importantly, the IODA Member can be confident that an IODA event can be hosted anywhere in the world to equal high standard.

On the water the IODA Regatta Committee continually focuses on providing the best sailing experience for the sailors. Looking to the future of Optimist racing, this year the Race Officer Development Program is maintained and in 2022 a Deputy RO is assigned to each event for training. Safety on the water remains always the priority. Each event Organiser must produce, to IODA requirements, an afloat Safety Protocol. Mandatory safety requirements are in place for Coach support vessels in the rules of all events. Additionally, our manuals, documents and race management guidelines continue to be constantly reviewed and updated.

In 2022 the goal of realizing more women officials at Optimist events is being reached. The IODA RC continually analyzes the participation of girl sailors to implement methods to increase for future. More professional female mentors on the water at events is one way, and broadening accessibility to their career pathways through upcoming Webinars is planned. At the 2022 Arkas Optimist World Championship half of the Jury Officials' Panel is female, and the IODA Course Representative is IRO Elena Papazoglou. Women ROs will participate with IODA in two Continental championships later this year. Focus has also shifted to the event awards for sailors, and the establishment of an IODA Perpetual Trophy for the top girl across every championship is intended in 2022.

Finally, the IODA Regatta Committee is aware of the deep history of the Optimist Class, unique in the sport of sailing. Beginning in 2022, the IODA Regatta Committee will lead the Class development of an Optimist History Website that will build a digital space to contain and make accessible this special and important history to the Optimist Sailors, the IODA Members and the public in perpetuity. This project will launch during late 2022—early 2023 in time to celebrate the 50th Anniversary of the Class, and the 60th years of Optimist World Championships.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the members of the IODA Regatta Committee for donating their time to the Class for the benefit of the Optimist sailors around the world: Andres Perez (ESP), Ilker Bayindir (TUR), and Elena Papazoglou (CYP). On behalf of the IODA Regatta Committee, special thanks is extended to Susan Elliot Beatty, the IODA Regatta Secretary, for her continuous hard work daily to support the Optimist championships and the many IODA Regatta Committee initiatives. Thank you also to Fiona Kidd, the Secretary General of IODA for her continued support.

#### 8. Annual Audited Accounts

**S.V. Balachander, Treasurer** presented the 2021Annual Report which includes IODA's financials as on December 31, 2021.

Sales almost doubled as demand for both boat and sails came back after the pandemic from \$175,761 to \$343,581 in 2021. Sail label sales increased by 64% while boat plaque sales doubled compared to 2020. We also had revenue increase from IODA Championships as we conducted more events.

With the increase in activity, we had a corresponding increase in expenses. We were able to close the year with a surplus of \$27,569 which is about \$50,000 swing from a loss in 2020 of \$24,847. This swing in profit is attributed to increased sales and the increase in fees that members voted in the last few years.

Cash on the balance sheet increased from \$363,127 to only \$368,047 a mere 4,920. Payables were reduced by about \$30,000 accounting for majority of cash out flow. World Sailing had given IODA an opportunity to delay in paying fees due to WS to help class associations tide over the pandemic. This postponement of WS fees were paid in the year ending 2021.

**Decision:** The 2020 Audited Annual Report was approved.

- a) S.V. Balachander reported at this time IODA is tracking ahead of projections and expect to meet 54,000 in income this year.

# 17. Information from World Sailing Meetings

**S.V. Balachander** reported on behalf of Fiona Kidd on the activities of World Sailing. World Sailing is the governing body of sailing and IODA is one of the oldest International Classes that is still very active. We became an IYRU International Class in 1983. Next year we are celebrating our 50th Anniversary as an international class.

Today, IODA is governed by World Sailing and they help us we manage our class and our Class Rules. Approved Class Rule changes made at the IODA AGM are required to be approved by World Sailing. This often takes several months to get approved, hence we do not publish our class rules until January 1 of following year. IODA works very closely with the technical department at World Sailing.

Each boat built must apply a World Sailing Plaque that we manage and distribute. Our database has over 95,000 records. 175000 Optimists have been built since becoming an International Class.

IODA has several World Sailing International Measurers on our Technical Committee, and the Regatta Committee Members are all World Sailing Race Officers, International Judges or International Umpires. World Sailing Official's certification is very important in the technical running of the Optimist Class. The Regatta Committee Chair, Ricardo Navarro is the Chair of the World Sailing Race Officials Committee, one of the most important committees in World Sailing.

World Sailing ahs been rebuilding their organization with new staff and offices in London following a few difficult years financially. The first in-person Annual conference and meetings since 2019 will take place this November in Abu Dhabi. The International Classes Committee which has representatives from all classes will meet to discuss issues of class rules, safety, and governance.

World Sailing has been for several years working to modernize its governance structure. They have made significant progress in the past year in this area following considerable consultation with members and stakeholders. The Classes are a major cornerstone of the new governance structure. World Sailing is planning on having it approved at the Annual Conference.

a) BAH proposed under North American Championship Condition 7.1 c to increase the number of allocated places from 4 to 8 spots going forward.

**Decision**: Approved with 6 voted from the North American Members. None against.

b) There was a discussion regarding the dissatisfaction of the tracking at the event from our Members from POR, MLT and CYP.

**Action:** There will be a full review and investigation of the tracking at the World Championship and a report requested by Trac Trac.

c) Our Member from AZE commented that there are not enough social activities for the sailors at the Worlds.

**Action:** The social activities are the generally the responsibility of the event organizers, however, IODA will consult with the current WC Organizers to see if this is something that can be addressed this year. IODA will take this comment under advisement and will endeavor to add more social activities for sailors at the Worlds and other IODA Championships in the future.

d) S,V. Balachander (Bala) is retiring as the IODA Treasurer. President Kevin Whitcraft presented Bala with a small token of appreciation and thanked him for his many years of service and careful financial stewardship over the past few years. Bala joined as IODA Treasurer in 2017. Kevin also thanked Bala, who is a World Sailing International Measurer, for his volunteer time and contribution as a member of the IODA Technical Committee for the past 4 years.

President Kevin Whitcraft thanked all the Executive, Technical Committee and Regatta Committee Members for all their hard work as volunteers in the governance of the Optimist Class. He also thanked all of the Member Representatives for their attendance at the 2022 AGM and for their comments and feedback. Kevin officially adjourned the meeting at 2:30pm
